The Facebook founder and the head of Alphabet's Google, the owner of YouTube, posted a series of statements and a group of more than 300 business leaders wrote a letter to Trump, urging him to keep his campaign promise to restore America's credibility in the wake of the Paris climate agreement. Zuckerberg said the Paris deal, which would reduce carbon emissions, could be "set back for decades" if the U.S. follows through on its plan to withdraw. "We strongly disagree with the intent and the need for such actions," said Zuckerberg, who has not shied away from speaking his mind. Facebook founder and CEO Mark Zuckerberg says he disagrees with President Donald Trump's decision to pull out of the Paris climate accord, saying the move "could set the U.S. back for decades." (Reuters) Google CEO Sundar Pichai wrote a similar letter to Trump and tweeted a link to the business community letter. Alphabet and Facebook are two of the world's most valuable companies and the work of Google and Facebook could be affected by the Paris accord. On Saturday, the CEOs of the four largest oil companies in the U.S. also wrote a letter to Trump urging him to keep the country in the deal. Hundreds of business leaders were part of the pushback. LinkedIn's Reid Hoffman was a signatory of the letter and also wrote an op-ed in The New York Times about the dangers of withdrawing from the Paris climate agreement.
